8 9 10 11 12	WHEREAS, The Vermont Medical Society (VMS) initiated a survey of Vermont physicians in order to better understand their views on satisfaction with practice, responsibility for health care in the ideal system, and health care priorities; and
13 14 15	WHEREAS, Included in the 24 item survey were six questions on responsibility for health care in the ideal system developed by the New Hampshire Medical Society; and
16 17 18	WHEREAS, Physicians were asked to indicate whether they "strongly agree", "agree", were "neutral", "disagree", or "strongly disagree" with each of the 24 statements; and
19 20 21	WHEREAS, Two hundred Vermont physicians responded to the survey between June 1 and June 30, 2008; and
22 23 24 25	WHEREAS, While the gender of respondents appears to generally reflect the demography of Vermont physicians as reported by the VTDOH, the age distribution was somewhat younger and there was a higher percentage of primary care physicians responding than the demography of Vermont physicians; and
26 27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, Eighty-four percent (169) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "In the ideal healthcare system, basic healthcare would be available to all individuals as part of the social contract, a right similar to basic education, police and fire protection; and
31 32 33 34 35 36	WHEREAS, Sixty-eight percent (137) of those responding indicated they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "I would favor a simplified payer system in which public funds, collected through taxes, were used to pay directly for services to meet the basic health care needs of all citizens; " and
37 38 39 40	WHEREAS, Ninety-one percent (182) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "Putting aside paperwork and administrative issues, I find the practice of medicine deeply satisfying;" and
41 42 43 44	WHEREAS, Eighty-seven percent (174) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "Paperwork and administrative issues interfere with my ability to serve patients well; and
45 46 47	WHEREAS, Ninety-seven percent (194) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "The health of individuals can be enormously affected by their personal behaviors and choices;" and

WHEREAS, Ninety percent (181) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: Continued under-reimbursement by Medicaid will result in access problems for low-income Vermonters;" and WHEREAS, Ninety-one percent (183) of those responding indicated that they "strongly agreed" or "agreed" with the following statement: "Facing a shortage of primary care physicians and a rapidly aging population, the recruitment and retention of physicians should be a high priority;" now therefore be it RESOLVED, In order to ensure access to high quality health care services, the

RESOLVED, In order to ensure access to high quality health care services, the Vermont Medical Society urges the General Assembly and the Administration to make the issues related to recruitment and retention of physicians a high legislative priority; and be it further

RESOLVED, The Vermont Medical Society supports the concept that basic healthcare would be available to all individuals as part of the social contract; and be it further.

RESOLVED, The Vermont Medical Society supports a simplified payer system to pay directly for services, in which paperwork and administrative issues are minimized, under-reimbursement by Medicaid is addressed; and be it further.

RESOLVED, The Vermont Medical Society encourages individuals to take greater responsibility for their personal behaviors and choices to the extent they are able; and be it further

RESOLVED, The Vermont Medical Society's survey makes it clear that while Vermont physicians are dedicated to the profession of medicine and the care of their patients, the present system of financing impedes physicians from being able to adequately provide for the health care needs of all Vermonters.
